

### A Separate Political Subdivision of the State of Ohio

Mill Creek MetroParks is a separate political subdivision of the state of Ohio and is not part of any local or other political subdivision.

It was established on January 1, 1989, under Chapter 1545 of the Ohio Revised Code, as the successor to the Youngstown Township Park District subsequent to the voters' approval of the conversion. Mill Creek MetroParks serves all of Mahoning County.

The MetroParks currently operates Mill Creek Park, located in Boardman Township and the City of Youngstown; Yellow Creek Park in Struthers; the MetroParks Farm in Canfield Township; Vickers Nature Preserve in Ellsworth Township; MetroParks Bikeway, which traverses Austintown Township, Canfield Township, and the City of Canfield; Sebring Woods in the Village of Sebring; Cranberry Run Headwaters in Boardman Township; Sawmill Creek Preserve in Canfield Township; Collier Preserve in Boardman Township; McGuffey Wildlife Preserve in Coitsville Township; Mill Creek Wildlife Sanctuary in Beaver Township; Egypt Swamp Preserve in Green Township; Hawkins Marsh in Smith Township; and Springfield Forest in Springfield Township.

MetroParks revenue is derived from three main sources: receipts of a tax levy upon all real estate within the District, receipts from the Local Government Fund, and income from other activities (greens fees, facility rentals, recreation rentals, and programs).



# ENHANCING VISITOR EXPERIENCE WITH A NEW MOBILE APP

In July 2024, Mill Creek MetroParks introduced a new mobile app to make visiting the park and trails more accessible and convenient for the public.

The mobile app empowers users with instant access to essential park information and navigation tools. Designed to enhance trip planning and improve the visitor experience, the app serves as a reliable resource both before and during visits. Users can access accurate, real-time updates on trails, closures, and recreational opportunities across the MetroParks system.

Powered by OuterSpatial, the app is free to download and available for both iPhone and Android devices. One of its standout features is offline mapping and navigation, ensuring uninterrupted access even in areas without a cell signal. Key features of the app include:

- Navigating while on trails
- Discovering new places
- Locating parking, restrooms, picnic areas and other park amenities
- Accessing information about ecological, geological and historical points of interest
- Receiving notifications about hazards, closures, and other timely information
- Receiving special event information

- Sharing experiences and photos and connect with others who love the outdoors
- Reporting conditions, hazards, and incidents at visited locations

#### **VOLUNTEERS**

Volunteers play a crucial role in supporting various areas of park operations. Their efforts bolster staff initiatives by assisting with events and programs, educating and engaging the local community, and ultimately fostering greater support for our parks. The contributions of volunteers are invaluable to both Mill Creek MetroParks and Mahoning County.

In 2024, volunteers recorded an impressive 3,973 hours of service, contributed by 120 active park-wide volunteers and 12 organizational groups. Their time and talents supported a wide range of events, exhibits, and activities, including gardening and horticulture, conservation and preservation efforts, community service projects, Citizen Advisory Committees, Field Trips, Ready, Set, Grow Gardening Program, Adopt-a-Crag, trolley tours, tractor wagon tours, hikes, kayak guiding, kiosk stocking, programs, and special events. Some notable events where volunteers made a significant impact include the Farm Animal Baby Shower, Pumpkin Carving, Pumpkin Walk at Twilight, Old-Fashioned

Christmas at the Mill, Bug Day, and Winter Celebration.

The dedication of our volunteers was celebrated at the annual Volunteer Recognition Dinner, held in September in the Rossi Auditorium at Fellows Riverside Gardens. Volunteers who met a specific hour criteria received a complimentary Mill Creek MetroParks volunteer t-shirt to be worn during volunteering.

Each year, efforts are made to recruit and

grow the volunteer program. The Community Engagement Director remains actively involved in outreach and collaboration to promote volunteerism. In 2024, the Director continued to serve on Youngstown State University's Community Partner Advisory Committee, focusing on engaging YSU students in volunteer opportunities. Participation in the Youngstown State University Volunteer Fair and visits to various local public schools helped educate area youth about Mill Creek MetroParks and the available volunteer roles. Additionally, the Director renewed membership with the Forum for Volunteer Administrators and attended various workshops and meetings to stay informed on best practices in volunteer management.

The dedication, time, and energy of our volunteers make a profound difference in the success of Mill Creek MetroParks, and we are deeply grateful for their continued support and commitment.







## MILL CREEK METROPARKS POLICE 2024

The MetroParks Police Department provides 24-hour patrol coverage across Park District lands and facilities.

The department offers comprehensive law enforcement services, including proactive enforcement, facility security, land and resource preservation, and a visible presence at park events. The MetroParks Police have full police powers to enforce laws, park rules, make arrests, and issue summonses.

The department consists of both sworn and non-sworn staff. Sworn personnel include both full-time and part-time officers. Additionally, a non-sworn Auxiliary staff is maintained who assist with traffic direction and event security. The department also employs non-sworn Rangers who support officers in various tasks and patrol functions throughout the parks.

In 2024, the MetroParks Police Department maintained its certification from the Ohio Collaborative. Staff participated in a variety of training programs, including:

All sworn officers completed a minimum of 24 hours of continuous professional training (CPT) mandated by the State of Ohio. Additionally, all Lexipol policy updates were processed promptly.

Officers complete Daily Training Bulletins (DTBs) on various topics, many of which align with Ohio Collaborative Standards. The department reviews its Bias-Based Policing policy annually with all staff. Officers maintain demographic statistics on self-initiated traffic stops.

Additionally, in 2024 the department earned the prestigious Lexipol Gold Performance Award for achieving the highest levels of policy compliance and completion throughout the previous year.

## **GOLF & RECREATION**

#### MILL CREEK GOLF COURSE

### In 2024, Mill Creek Golf Course saw several important capital improvements.

The South parking lot underwent significant upgrades, including new drainage basins, fresh asphalt, and enhanced entryway landscaping. Additionally, the architectural design of the irrigation system for both the North and South Courses was finalized over the summer, paving the way for future construction as part of the department's 10year capital improvement plan. Equipment upgrades included the purchase of three new fairway mowers, while new cart barn fencing was added near the Fieldhouse.

January marked the opening of the new Indoor Golf Player Development Center, located on the second floor of the Fieldhouse. The center features three golf simulator bays, a putting green, a club fitting area, staff office, restrooms, and storage. Later in the year, the Wick Recreation Center at Wick Recreation Area opened in September. This 4-season, multi-functional space offers a team shop, equipment rentals, concessions, a community room for public programming and private events, an outdoor patio, recreation offices, and newly renovated restroom facilities.

During the winter months, Mill Creek MetroParks PGA staff worked diligently to expand their customer base by attending major golf shows in Cleveland, Columbus,



Michigan, New York, and Pittsburgh, supported by a tourism grant from the Mahoning Valley Visitors and Convention Bureau. These efforts led to an additional 6,400+ rounds of golf and overnight stays in Mahoning County in 2024. The travel show participation continues to foster growth in both golf rounds and tourism for Mill Creek MetroParks.

Mill Creek Golf Course was proud to host three collegiate tournaments in 2024. In April, the Presidents Athletic Conference (PAC) NCAA Division III Championship brought men's and women's collegiate golf programs to Mill Creek. September saw the NCAA Roseann Schwartz Invitational, presented by Youngstown State University, featuring 20 collegiate women's golf programs. The event,

held on Labor Day, saw the Youngstown State University team secure the title for the second consecutive year. Mill Creek also hosted the NCAA Kick Off Classic, presented by Youngstown State University, with 12 teams from nine neighboring states.

AJGA Junior All-Star National Invitational and AJGA Preview Tournament on the South Course. This year, the tournament enjoyed continued sponsorship from the Mercy Health Foundation, who committed \$100,000 over four years. The financial impact to the

Mahoning Valley in 2024 reached \$408,268, In June, the course hosted the 9th Annual

thanks to hotel stays, dining, recreational spending, green fees, and shopping. Since 2016. the total economic impact exceeds \$3 million, with over \$119,000 raised for local charities.

Mill Creek also welcomed three U.S. Kids Cleveland Junior Tour events, including the Junior Optimist International East Coast Regional Qualifier, and the 5th Annual Notah BeGay III Tournaments in August, which brought players and families from 47 states and 11 countries. In July, the 13th Drive, Chip & Putt Local Qualifier was held at the Mill Creek Outdoor Practice Facility, sending another local qualifier to the National Championship at Augusta National Golf Club.

Mill Creek continued its national programming with the 5th Annual Co-Ed PGA HOPE (Helping Our Patriots Everywhere) Program, part of the PGA of America's PGA REACH Foundation. The program offers military members and veterans the opportunity to learn and play golf. A record-breaking turnout for the program made Mill Creek the leading site in Ohio for attendance. Additionally, Mill Creek's PGA staff was honored with the prestigious "Game Changer Award" by the PGA of America for their support of the PGA Reach Foundation's flagship programs.

Mill Creek Golf Course also received the Platinum Award for Exceptional Customer Service, and both the North and South Courses ranked in Golf Week and Golf Digest Magazines' 2024 National Rankings: North Course #11 and South Course #14.

#### RECREATION

In 2024, the Mill Creek MetroParks Recreation Department provided a variety of programs catering to different age groups and interests, including cross-country meets, marathons, youth golf leagues, soccer leagues, sand volleyball leagues, NHL DEK hockey leagues, Tiny Tikes soccer, recreational hikes, and more. These programs were designed to appeal to a wide demographic, from toddlers to seniors.

Significant improvements were made at the Wick Recreation Area, including new rooftops, fresh paint, and new fencing at the Wick Par-3 building. The newly opened Wick Recreation Center became the hub for



restrooms, concessions, community room rentals, recreation offices, team merchandise, and outdoor seating areas.

The NCAA-regulation cross-country course at the Mill Creek MetroParks Farm opened in September and hosted multiple collegiate and high school events. Available for general public use when not reserved, the course provides a new venue for marathons and races throughout the year.

Mill Creek's Glacier Boathouse opened for the summer season, providing water recreation

activities to record numbers of visitors. Additionally, 48 new boat racks were unveiled at Lake Newport in November, with rental availability starting in early 2025.

Recreation staff completed certifications in CPR, First Aid, and AED training, and represented Mill Creek MetroParks at the Ohio Parks and Recreation Association (OPRA) Conference in Sandusky, Ohio, for continued education and professional development.


The total attendance for the D.D. and Velma Davis Education & Visitor Center at Fellows Riverside Gardens in 2024 was approximately 143,000.

## **OUR PEOPLE**

### Our people are committed to the long-term success of Mill Creek MetroParks.

During 2024, Mill Creek MetroParks staff provided services to the community and visitors from around the world.

The MetroParks staff consists of 72 full time. 37 part time, and 31 seasonal employees. 2024 brought 9 employee promotions and 89 hiring actions. All full time and part time employees received a 2.5 percent general wage increase in 2024.

Our staff provided many recreational and educational program and events for all ages in 2024. A new Recreation Manager was hired this year, operating out of the newly opened Wick Recreation Center. The MetroParks looks forward to contributing to the health and wellness of the community by continuing to offer recreational programing and opportunities for physical activity.

Employee well-being and health remains a top priority for Mill Creek MetroParks. In 2024, the employee-led committees met on multiple occasions to plan and discuss concerns and beneficial activities to improve employee experience. In addition to physical health and safety the MetroParks also continues to support general well-being by offering an Employee Assistance Program for unexpected life events and stress management.



Each year our staff continues to invest in learning and professional development opportunities to strengthen our ability to provide services to the community and preserve Mill Creek MetroPark's natural resources. All MetroParks staff members meet quarterly to participate in trainings on topics such as emergency action plans, MetroParks updates, and anti-harassment.

Additional staff certifications earned in 2024 include ISA Arborist, Certificate of Interpretive Guiding (CIG), Playground Safety Inspector, CPR Instructor, Entomology, and NFL Flag Football. The MetroParks has also implemented a tuition reimbursement policy in 2024. This policy allows eligible employees to improve job skills and enhance opportunities for advancement within the MetroParks.



# INFRASTRUCTURE

#### **GENERAL IMPROVEMENTS:**

#### **Annual Parking Lot Improvements**

Mill Creek Golf Course South Parking
Lot project included stormwater
improvements and asphalt resurfacing.
Stormwater work included installation
of new catch basins and culverts,
regrading, and demolition of existing
impervious surfaces. Asphalt work
included new asphalt surfacing, parking
blocks, improved cart path connectivity
including a new crosswalk and
connection to the East Golf Hike & Bike
Trail Fording parking lot. Additionally,
trailhead improvements included
new signage, bollards, and safety
improvements.

**2024 Expended:** \$212,716.00

#### **Annual Trail Improvements**

- West Newport Hiking Trail (Newport Dam to Covered Bridge) Improvements included repairs to existing stormwater infrastructure and new installation. This included drain inlets, underdrains and culverts, restacking of existing sandstone retaining walls, new aggregate surfacing, improved signage and trailhead features.
- MetroParks Bikeway improvements from Kirk Road to New Road, including the Fox Chase Spur Trail involved existing pavement planing, installation





of new asphalt courses, new topsoil and aggregate shoulders, seeding, and mulching.

 Vickers Nature Preserve equestrian trail improvements included repair to existing stormwater infrastructure including culverts and swale crossings, along with aggregate overlay of existing trail and installation of over 0.10 miles of new trail.

**2024 Expended:** \$236,940.800

## Annual Pavilion/Structure Improvements

- Vickers Nature Preserve existing infrastructure upgrades included replacement of exterior siding and trim, along with painting of stables, picnic pavilion, office, and storage barns
- Wick Recreation Area Batting Cage and Par 3 Building roof replacements.
   Additionally, soffit, fascia, and lighting upgrades, along with utility fence replacement.
- Roof Repairs and replacements including Lanterman's Mill, Morely Pavilion, Golf Course Fieldhouse, Slippery Rock Pavilion, and Administration Office.
- Miscellaneous repairs to existing pavilions and cabins throughout the MetroParks.

#### Fellows Riverside Gardens Davis Center and Rose Garden Site Improvements

- Improvements to the Davis Center included purchase and installation of tables for the lower Auditorium terrace, lighting and ceiling replacement, HVAC and electrical upgrades, and interior painting.
- Improvements to the Rose Garden include irrigation and stormwater drainage improvements and installation of new, replacement roses in Rose Garden.
- Improvements to the general Fellows Riverside Gardens included restoration of paver walkways, fountain maintenance, and replacement of the vegetation within the islands of the existing parking lot with new plant selections.
- The existing outdoor restroom was rehabilitated to facility year-round use with upgrades including heating, insulation, new utility service and equipment. The project also included a new metal roof, siding, and storefront vestibule.



## NATURAL RESOURCES

#### **CANADA GOOSE MANAGEMENT**

Canada goose management efforts were continued in 2024. Various MetroParks departments carried out Canada goose harassment efforts at key locations throughout the MetroParks using pyrotechnic launchers, lasers, and exclusionary fencing. Following harassment activities, a nest destruction permit was obtained through ODNR. USDA-APHIS Wildlife Services was contracted to perform nest inspection and egg addling activities at these same key locations. In total, thirteen (13) nests containing 53 eggs were located and of those, twelve (12) nests and 46 eggs were treated. No addling took place at the Mill Creek Wildlife Sanctuary. The 7th annual Canada goose count performed by the local Audubon Society produced a 2024 population count of 257 individuals throughout the park, a slight increase from the 2023 count of 212 individuals. Public outreach efforts, including signage, public service announcements, brochures, enforcement, and education programs were also continued to further the "Do Not Feed Wildlife" campaign throughout the MetroParks.

#### WHITE-TAILED DEER MANAGEMENT

The 2023-2024 management year marked the inaugural year for the MetroParks' deer management program. In total, 197 deer were harvested, 38 of which were donated to local food banks, resulting in 1,355.8 pounds of venison and over 1,100 meals to those in



need. Assessments of both forest health and deer populations throughout the MetroParks will continue annually, and the program will adapt to meet management objectives as we move towards ecological recovery.

#### 17TH ANNUAL "BIG SIT"

In October, volunteers participated in the 17th annual "Big Sit" event at the Mill Creek Wildlife Sanctuary. This annual international birding competition provides the opportunity for sites around the world to battle against each other, with participants hoping to record

the highest number of bird species observed from one location within a 24-hour period. This year a total of 70 bird species were observed during this event at the Wildlife Sanctuary, ranking among the best birding locations in Ohio. Separate from the "Big Sit", numerous volunteers contribute to an annual species count at the Sanctuary, which documents the total number of different bird species encountered at the Sanctuary for a given year. In total, 205 bird species were observed at the Sanctuary throughout 2024, with the all-time species count being 260.



#### NON-NATIVE/INVASIVE PLANTS

Efforts continued this year to reduce and control non-native/invasive plants throughout areas of the MetroParks, most notably the Collier Preserve, Mill Creek Wildlife Sanctuary, and Hawkins Marsh where a combined 65.5-acres were treated. Herbicide applications and/or physical removal of undesirable species were also conducted at facilities such as the Lily Pond, Ford Nature Center, Mirror Pond, Lake Newport Wetlands, and the MetroParks Farm.

#### **HEALTHY STREAMS INITIATIVE**

The MetroParks continued the Healthy
Streams Initiative, an annual project aimed at restoring natural flow patterns and reducing erosion along Mill Creek and its tributaries by removing fallen trees and woody debris from the stream. In 2024, the project focused on Mill Creek as it flows through the southern portions of Mill Creek Park, beginning at the Fording Bridge and continuing north toward Shields Road. This year's project successfully improved 5,809 linear feet of stream.

Throughout the lifetime of this program, Mill Creek MetroParks has improved over 10 miles of stream including portions of Mill Creek, Indian Run, and Anderson Run.

# RESTORATION EFFORTS AT MIRROR POND AND ORCHARD MEADOW PICNIC AREA

Mirror Pond and the Orchard Meadow Picnic Area were the focus of restoration efforts, beginning in 2023 and continuing into 2024. Most notably, Mirror Pond was dredged and restored to its historic footprint (~0.4-acres). The accumulated sediment was utilized to improve grading throughout the Orchard Meadow Picnic Area. Additional work to improve trail connections, add picnic amenities, and native species plantings throughout the area will continue into 2025.

#### LILY POND IMPROVEMENTS

The Lily Pond was the focus of numerous improvement projects in 2024, most notably continued plantings to enhance the overall biodiversity of the site and the establishment of a new pollinator waystation. The Lily Pond also received ongoing management efforts focusing on algae treatments, invasive species treatment, and invasive species removal.

## SUMMER ALGAL BLOOMS TREATED AT LAKE NEWPORT

Lake Newport was treated in July of 2024 with an algaecide to help combat late summer algal blooms that are typical of Lake Newport. This is the fourth year of treatment and Lake Newport has responded well.

# FISH STOCKING EFFORTS CONTINUED THROUGHOUT THE METROPARKS

The MetroParks' spring fish stocking efforts continued in 2024 with stockings taking place at Lake Glacier (in partnership with ODNR), Yellow Creek Park, Vickers Nature Preserve, and the MetroParks Farm. This program

ensures high-quality fishing opportunities for anglers throughout the MetroParks.

# TREE PLANTING INITIATIVES CONTINUED AT MILL CREEK WILDLIFE SANCTUARY AND VICKERS NATURE PRESERVE

Through partnerships with FirstEnergy,
Boardman Subaru, and the YSU Legacy
Forest Committee, the MetroParks continued
tree planting initiatives at the Mill Creek
Wildlife Sanctuary and Vickers Nature
Preserve, successfully planting approximately
1900 native trees in an effort to reforest
areas of reverting farmland. In total, these
partnerships have resulted in over 6,000
trees being planted since 2021.

## MANAGEMENT OF HEMLOCK WOOLLY ADELGID CONTINUED

Through continued partnership with The Nature Conservancy, management of the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid, a non-native insect that threatens Eastern Hemlock (Tsuga canadensis) populations took place throughout Mill Creek Park. Additional surveys and treatments were completed in 2024 to combat the adelgid in the areas surrounding Slippery Rock Trail, East Cohasset Trail, Artists Trail, Birch Hill Cabin, Bears Den Cabin, Cascade Run, and the Ford Nature Center.




